Holy Trinity Bellringers

Our ringers have been out supporting practices at Beccles, South Walsham, Woodton, Ashill and St. Peter Mancroft in Norwich.



Quarter Peals have been rung at Loddon including Plain Bob

Triples, London Surprise Major, Stedman Caters and Plain Bob Royal on our simulator. The band for the Plain Bob Royal was mostly made up of local ringers and was a first in method for Jeannine Roe and David Webb as Conductor. A Quarter Peal of Norwich Surprise Minor was rung at Norton Subcourse prior to a practice held there.

We rang in a Peal at Gt. Ryburgh during October which was dedicated to a fallen soldier from the parish in the Great War. Forty three men were lost from Gt. Ryburgh and a Peal is being rung for every one on the anniversary of their death. So far thirty have been completed with a further thirteen scheduled to be rung next year. The peal of seven minor methods took 2 hours 55 minutes to complete.

An Eastern Branch practice meeting took place on the eight bells at Saxlingham Nethergate during October.

By the time this edition of Contact is published, we will have rung for **Remembrance Sunday (12th November)**, both at Holy Trinity for the morning service and a Half-Muffled Quarter Peal of Grandsire Triples in the afternoon. We will also have rung the bells at Norton Subcourse in the afternoon. In the lead up to Christmas, the bells will ring out in celebration for all the events and services planned including the Victorian evening open house on December 8th. The annual Christmas Peal at Holy Trinity is scheduled for Saturday 30th December starting at 2.30pm and, if successful, finishing around 5.15 pm.

As another year comes to a close, we can look back on a very busy 2017. We have rung for eight weddings at Loddon and several others at surrounding churches. Over forty Quarter Peals have also been successfully completed as well as two peals. The Tuesday night practices at Holy Trinity continue to be well supported both by local ringers and our many weekly visitors. Generally many churches struggle to find enough ringers for Sunday services, but we are usually able to ring every Sunday all year round, even when the church is not being used in the Winter months.

Having said that, we are always keen to hear from anyone interested in learning how to ring church bells and to join our enthusiastic local band. We are well placed at Loddon to teach new people and have been doing so for many years now. We continue to support ringers from surrounding churches helping them to advance their skills.

Also, with a state of the art teaching centre about to be built in the tower at St. Peter Mancroft in Norwich, our area is a great place to learn bell ringing. Continued bottom of next page

Can you Host a child from Belarus for the month of June 2018?

We are a local Link for the Chernobyl Children's Life Line charity. Each year we raise money to bring a small group of 9 - 11 year girls and boys from Belarus to give them a much needed health break from the Chernobyl contamination. We need families and individuals who can open their homes and hearts to host 1 or 2 children during their stay in the Beccles and Lowestoft areas.

The Chernobyl Children's Life Line charity was established in 1992 to support children (and their families) from Belarus and Ukraine affected by the world's worst nuclear disaster. Belarus received over 70% of the radioactive fallout from the Chernobyl nuclear explosion in April 1986. As the result, thousands are born every year with, or go on to develop thyroid cancer, bone cancer and leukaemia. Seven million people living in the affected areas received the highest known exposure to radiation in the history of the atomic age. The air, soil and water courses are polluted with radiation and will continue to be so for hundreds of years to come.

Our Charity brings children to the UK because a month away from the contamination, eating good nourishing food, drinking clean water and breathing clean air improves their health and gives their immune systems a chance to recover. It also gives them a once in a life time opportunity and an experience they will probably never forget. For example, Belarus is land locked. A visit to Suffolk presents the only opportunity the children will have to play on the beach and paddle in the sea.

Every year we aim to bring a group of children for a health break in this area. While we are lucky to have lots of people who offer their support with activities while they are here, the children cannot come unless we have Host families or individuals who can share their homes with one or two children for the 4 weeks of the visit.

While the children don't speak English, this is never a problem because they come with a Group Leader / Interpreter and we are able to give host families lots of support.

News from Hales and Heckingham Parish Council

The Council has a number of projects under way:

Communication has taken place with residents about improvements to the village playing field and tenders are being sought from suitable suppliers with a view to having all work completed by late Spring 2018.



The Council has ordered a defibrillator and we hope that this will be installed on the outside wall of the Masala Garden Restaurant.

Our District Councillor has provided £1000 from her Members Ward Allowance to assist with the cost of this project.

Our Community Compost Scheme has had another good year. We have collected around 9 tonnes of garden waste. We have supplies of soil improver available on request and this can be delivered for a small donation.

We await the commencement of the new roundabout at the junction of the A146 and B 1136 where work is due to start early in the New Year and be completed by April 2018. An added bonus from this is that Norfolk County Council has agreed to pay for the Village Gates that have been ordered to be installed at the Raveningham end of the Village on the B1136. This decision has resulted in a refund of over £1300 which helps considerably with the cost of the defibrillator, mentioned above.

Parish Councils can make a difference and improve local facilities by delivering projects similar to the above. To enable our Council to continue to enhance the facilities in the parish we would welcome further support as we have vacancies for three councillors.



Loddon and District Local History Society

It was a full house for our meeting in October to hear Elvie Herd tell us about what she had "Found In The Archives" during her search through various documents for the Loddon Parish Study. Elvie described her talk as a 'speedy' look at the lives of some of the people that had lived in Loddon and its fair to say that just one hour was not enough to included even a small percentage of the mass of material she has come across.

She told us about Loddon families such as the Uttings, their occupations and how property was passed on through the generations. William Utting, Attorney at Law, was the nephew of one Arthur Utting, surgeon of Loddon and Earsham. The property he and his wife owned in Loddon and a pub in Thurlton was inherited by their sons and sold in 1850. Another family was the Fayermans: Rev Francis Fayerman was rector of Hardley for many years but seems to have lived in Chedgrave. He was buried in Hardley with his wife Margaret Bayspoole, while Rev John Fayerman had a long association with Loddon. Living to the age of 92 he is buried in the Lady Chapel of Holy Trinity. John's son Arnall Cooper Fayerman, got into trouble for practising as a tanner without a licence. His grandson, Arnall Thomas Fayerman was kept busy mixing medicine with politics. Another Francis rose to the rank of Admiral in the Navy whilst his half brother Zaccheus, also a naval man, retired on half pay and proceeded to be a 'thorn in the side' of many a Loddon Church Warden!

Elvie illustrated her talk with maps, portraits and images of documents highlighting the long association of the Davy family who were builders and bricklayers, the tale of the Chet Valley Improvement, and the arrival of Woods, Sadd, Moore & Co and their partners. She also mentioned some of the fires, storms, accidents and disasters that befell those living here in the past.

Elvie has done an amazing job, and continues to spend countless hours researching. Everyone was very interested in what she had to say and we are all very grateful for her hard work. There is a folder in the library containing more of the above information. Do try to make time to look at any of the folders in the History Group Archive there - you'll find lots of fascinating stuff!

Read Any Good Books Lately?

Where does the time go? It's almost impossible to think this is the last of another year of book suggestions. Happy Christmas reading!

"The Goldfinch," by Donna Tartt At 864 pages long, this is a giant of a book and will take a long time to read! It's well worth the effort, though. In New York a young boy called Theo goes with his mother to an Art Gallery & Museum, and while they're there (but are in different rooms) a bomb goes off. Theo survives the explosion and comes away with a ring given him by an old man he'd tried to help after the explosion, plus the painting of The Goldfinch by Fabritius. From then on he leads a difficult life, living at times with his negligent father in Las Vegas, with friends in New York, or with the old man's business partner. From the latter he learns about the world of antiques. It is in the Las Vegas chapter of his life that he meets a boy called Boris – an extraordinary character - who befriends and influences him, and also introduces him to danger and the use of drugs. The other main person in Theo's life is the granddaughter of the old man he helped in the art gallery; he is in love with her from that day onwards. This complex novel is written superbly and movingly by Donna Tartt, with the painting of The *Goldfinch* being central to the plot throughout.

"The Universe Versus Alex Woods," by Gavin Extence It would be a very hard-to-please person who would not enjoy this book! The opening chapter catches one's interest instantly, and is really intriguing. As the rest of the story unfolds, one realises that the opening chapter covers what is almost the end of the story - it's cleverly done. The first novel by this author, it is very touching, though it never becomes sentimental. An unlooked for and unlikely friendship forms the basis of the story, the two characters who form the friendship being a young boy and a reclusive old man. The boy, Alex, is a bit of a misfit amongst his peers and his life is complicated for him by having a hippie, clairvoyant mother, no known father, and the occurrence of a particularly extraordinary incident. At times it's very funny and at other times it's really sad. It is definitely a book not to be missed!

"State of Wonder," by Ann Patchett A powerful and remarkable story about drug research being done in the Amazon rainforests for a company in Minnesota. Dr. Swenson, the woman doctor heading up the research, has been working out there for years and years, but has become less and less communicative with those who are paying her back in Minnesota, so the company head sends a pharmacologist out to try to find the doctor and get some answers about the progress of the research. He goes missing, is reported dead, and a second pharmacologist is despatched - this one being a 40-year-old woman who was once a medical student in the university where Dr Swenson used to lecture.

The descriptions of life in the rainforests, of the rainforests themselves and the tribes living there, are utterly absorbing. The plot is intricate and the disparate characters vividly drawn.

Nature Notes

The end of another year and beginning of the new. How many times lately have you said 'I just don't know where it has gone?' Time definitely seems to fly by much more quickly than ever nowadays. In our busy world everyone is rushing to the next thing pushed on by the pace of modern life but in actual fact, time is still the same. Looking back over my ramblings of 2017, I realise I'm always trying to slow everything down, asking you to 'take time', 'stop and look', 'sit and wait' and various other phrases. The natural world has its own rhythm, only altered when man intervenes, and in the coming year I'm sure this is a thought worth remembering.

Amongst my memorable finds for last year I was really pleased to see frogspawn again and lots of newts, both in the garden pond. Later in the year there were a great number of Dragonflies that appeared miraculously from their outer shells when emerging as nymphs, from the water. Bee Orchids were fewer than previous years but there were still several. Broomrape, the strange leafless pinky/brown flower, popped up in the grass seemingly out of nowhere and the Barn Owl chicks were wonderful. I planted some nasturtium seeds to grow up netting on a fence. The flowers gave a good colour to the area but primarily they were for a caterpillar nursery. Large Whites, would you believe, are declining in numbers, mostly due to pesticides in gardens. Almost as soon as the plants started growing there were groups of tiny yellow eggs on the leaves which hatched into very hungry caterpillars. I really hope I've helped to swell their numbers for next season. According to 'those who know' at Butterfly Conservation, pesticides and other chemicals used in gardens are now considered to cause more harm to our wildlife than those that farmers put on the land. This is particularly bad for butterflies and other insects too. We really should stop using them (sorry Andrew).

My best 'catch' of last year in the moth trap has to have been a Lobster Moth and the best caterpillars were 7 Puss Moths that appeared on a Black Poplar sapling, again in the garden. These really strange creatures were fascinating to watch as they grew from day to day consuming nearly all the leaves. Once they disappeared to pupate in the ground, the tree just grew more. Another highlight was watching Swallows dipping into the pond. I don't think anyone is clear as to why they do this but it's certainly lovely to see. I think they were just having fun! All these things were seen in the garden and during the coming year I hope you'll take a little time to look for things of interest in yours. Holidays are wonderful but do try to spare time for the things under your nose on other days too.

Of course, before we can start looking for spring we must enjoy these few Winter months. I'm hoping for some decent snowfalls this year as we haven't seen much for a long time. I realise it's inconvenient for many and causes problems of its own, but it really does slow us down.

Gardening Notes

I've just heard the long range weather forecast and the weather forecasters talk of a very cold winter! I think I'll take this news with a pinch of salt. I'd be grateful if they could forecast 2 days ahead correctly, but we haven't had a cold winter since 2013 so you never know.

If it stays mild your lawns might need one final cut, but make sure to raise the cutting height. If you scalp any areas now the grass won't grow back until the spring. Keep clearing up dead leaves and composting them. I've spent years raking up leaves, and it's quite hard work. I've managed to get hold of a second hand leaf blower and my goodness how much easier it makes the job. I can clear an area ten times quicker now and it's so much easier. It was once a job I didn't look forward to, but now I don't mind at all.

At this time of year, whether it's mild or cold, rats and mice are looking for a warm, dry place with food close by, and this is often your greenhouse, garden shed, garage or even your house, so it's advisable to lay out your rat and mouse bait before you get a problem. It's easier to kill a few rats as they come into your garden, than to let them get established and try to kill lots of them. When placing bait make sure other animals can't get to it, so push the bait sachets well under garden sheds; and on the inside of buildings, place them around the walls hidden under boxes, as rats and mice feel safe feeding in confined dark spaces. When you find the dead vermin dig a hole in your garden at least a foot deep and bury them.

Outdoor pipes and taps should be protected from the cold weather, so cover them with proper foam lagging, and turn off the water supply to the outdoor tap. This should stop the water pipes bursting in very cold weather. When you can get in the garden, and when the fruit trees are dormant, it's a great time to prune them. Thin out older branches to open up the crown and cut back any damaged and diseased growth down to healthy wood. It's a good idea to Google "how to prune a fruit tree" because if you get it right you can improve your fruit yield considerably.

I hope you have a great Christmas and a healthy new year.
