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Ministerial Musings

I have spent the morning making houses—places for bugs to overwinter and birds to nest in the spring. Just as I was bringing some last bits to finish off, a robin flew down onto the roof of a bug house to inspect what I had been up to. It's all part of caring for our world—in this case the churchyard in Chedgrave, God's acre. If we can provide homes for some of our wildlife perhaps that will encourage them to thrive which can only be a good thing.

It set me to thinking about people in our communities, cities, countries—those with homes and those without. If you are reading this, then likely it has come through your letterbox and you are in the comfort of your own home. Lucky you! But what about those without anywhere to live?

I wonder if you can imagine what it might be like to be forced from your home by war or abuse, environmental disaster or financial crisis; leaving most if not all of your possessions behind; not knowing where you are going to spend the next night. There are millions of displaced people in the world; some on the move, some living in makeshift camps. And there are hundreds of people who are homeless in our own country—it is not a life choice for many. But surely everyone deserves somewhere safe and secure to live, don't they?

"Well, that's never going to happen", I hear you say. And I'm not surprised. The dream that everyone in the world will be healthy, happy and homed seems an impossible one. But where is the hope in that? And what does it have to do with us?

It's nearly Christmas. And as I think of Christmas, I reflect on the most amazing story of God making a home among humankind. Jesus, living with real people and demonstrating God's love in action; speaking out against the rich and powerful and speaking up for those on the edges of society, those who others look down on. If we have ears, we can hear that message still ringing out—love God and love your neighbour as yourself. That is what it has to do with us. If we hear that message and act on it, then we can bring hope to the homeless in our communities.

Worship in the Chet Valley

You will be warmly welcomed to any of our services. We hope to provide worship to suit everybody.

- <u>Holy Communion</u> is celebrated every Sunday at one or other of the churches in the Benefice, either Book of Common Prayer or Common Worship, with an informal Holy Communion service once a month in Chedgrave.
- Once a month there is an **Evening Prayer** service at Sisland.
- Services of Morning Worship are held in Loddon and Hardley.
- <u>Last Sunday Praise</u> is held on the Last Sunday of the month at St John's in Loddon: a chance to sing old and new Christian songs plus time to worship together.

Families and children are welcome at <u>all</u>our services.

Special provision is made at Chedgrave where there is a toilet and baby changing facilities.

- <u>Xpressions Café</u> Normally held at All Saints, Chedgrave, on the first Sunday every month between 10.00 a.m. and 12.00 noon. This is a relaxed and contemporary way of 'doing church'. You can come and go as you please for coffee, cake, crafts, games, songs and much more.

- <u>All Together Worship</u> on the third Sunday.

This is designed to be as inclusive as possible, a mixture of formality and informality; traditional and modern; activity and stillness. In short, we will attempt to provide a service which will have points of connection for children and adults - indeed people of all ages and all backgrounds.

In Loddon and Chedgrave there is an opportunity to meet after the service and enjoy a chat over tea or coffee.

<u>Home Communion</u>: If you would like home communion, because you are unable for any reason to get to a Sunday service, please contact the clergy or the Church Office and we will arrange for someone to bring communion to you.

At Chedgrave Church we are offering the chance to give someone a present for just two pounds through Embrace, one of the charities that we support, who work in the Middle East.

We have purchased 24 presents each at £2. The gifts include: vitamins and medicine, art supplies, school dinner, peanut butter,

eye test, and toothbrush and paste. If you would like one of these to be from you, please donate £2 and put a gift label on our gift tree during Advent signifying your gift.

Inspired by the idea of the exhibition Unto Us a Child is Born (see November Contact p 14) we have also purchased 4 gifts at £10 each – called 'Away in a Manger' this gift supports a village clinic so mums and babies have a local place to go for development checks and medicines.

Our vision is that refugees and asylum seekers will be welcome in the UK. They will get justice, live free of poverty and be able to successfully rebuild their lives.

The other charity we are supporting is **Loving by Giving.** Here is what they say about themselves:

Homelessness is a massive problem in the United Kingdom. People who are released from prison often have no place to stay and end up

on the streets without warm clothes or bedding or any hygiene products to help them keep clean. Loving by Giving is working with HMP Norwich to help people in this terrible situation by providing them with backpacks with some basic hygiene products and clothing to help them keep warm.

Holy Trinity Bellringers

Quarter peals of London Surprise Minor, Double Norwich Court Bob Major, Pudsey and London Surprise Major, Stedman Caters, and Lincolnshire Surprise Royal were successfully rung at Holy Trinity during October and November. We took part in



a Peal of seven Surprise Minor methods at Norton Subcourse to mark the retirement of the vicar there after eighteen years service in the Raveningham group of Parishes. We also helped with ringing for the visit of the Archbishop of Canterbury to Gt. Yarmouth Minster.

As 2018 is the 100th Anniversary of the end of World War One, celebrations of this event have taken place nationwide. Here at Loddon we rang the bells half muffled for the Remembrance Day morning service. In the afternoon, we rang the bells normally for a Quarter peal of Grandsire Triples to coincide with the national " "Ringing for Peace" celebrations. We also rang at Woodton for a Remembrance service and another service and a Quarter peal at Norton Subcourse. The bells were chimed at Aldeby, Toft Monks and Raveningham and for another service at Haddiscoe. We took part in another Quarter Peal in the evening at St. Margaret's, Lowestoft and also in a Half Muffled peal at St. Margaret's, Drayton for the Armistice.

The Norwich Diocesan Association have been training new ringers specially to ring at their churches for the Armistice. We have helped out at the new ringing centre at St. Peter Mancroft with some training and also at nearby Reedham. Thanks to a nationwide "Ringing Remembers" initiative, many towers were able to be rung for Remembrance that haven't for many years, such as at Hickling and Reedham.

The Eastern Branch of the NDA held its annual dinner which this year was at Continued on page 21



the East Hills bistro in Brundall. Nearly forty members attended from across the branch and after the meal we were entertained by a lively talk from a South Walsham ringer who is a consultant anaesthetist at the James Paget Hospital in Gorleston.

As we approach the end of another year, the bells will ring to celebrate all the services and events planned over the festive season. The annual Christmas Peal this year will be rung at Loddon on New Year's Day in the afternoon.

Loddon & District Local History Group

In October, Dr Richard Hoggett returned to share his knowledge of the Archaeology of the Monastic Life. Most of us know that medieval churches are always orientated with the altar facing east. But this turns out to be not always the case. Some of the most impressive medieval churches were built as part of Monastic Foundations with large precincts which included many ancillary buildings.

We have little idea of the layout of Saxon monasteries, as predominantly they would have been made of wood which does not survive. The Norman monasteries in East Anglia were predominantly made with flint & rubble faced with imported dressed stone, which since the Dissolution has been almost robbed out. In other parts of the country where there is local stone the ruins are often more complete.

The 9th century Plan of St Gall was the earliest blueprint for the layout of the component parts of the Monastery within its precinct. The majority of Benedictine related monasteries were versions of this plan. The proximity of running water and a source of safe drinking water were essential for the life of a community. There were times when the lay of the land and direction of flow of a nearby river meant that the layout of the buildings was changed, a cloister on the north of the church instead of the south, and even at Riveaux in Yorkshire the church not orientated east west.

The running water was needed for clearing waste from the site, and also for agriculture and driving mills The building of conduits and drains for moving clean and not so clean water into and around the site has in many places left structures which may well have been interpreted as tunnels.

The earliest of our monasteries were Benedictine, following the Rule of St Benedict who died on 547 AD. His Rule on how monks were to live in their community was written in Chapters which are divided into daily episodes to be read by the monks in the Chapter House before the other business of the day was discussed.

We saw aerial views of Bury St Edmunds Cathedral, which gave an idea of the scale of the Norman monastery church and its precinct and the proximity of running water. We were encouraged when visiting monastic sites to look at the whole area of the precinct and not only at the church, to give us a much rounder view of the life of the monks or nuns who had lived there.

modern philosophers and the relevant ideas of some philosophers from earlier centuries. Three or four times during each talk, she would get the 'class' to discuss various points among themselves and then express their views, making for a lively and vocal atmosphere.

Next Spring there will be a series of **10 talks entitled "A Good Day for a Fight"**, about the American West in the 19th century. Most of us will have seen Hollywood or Spaghetti Cowboy and Indian versions of how the West was won, but the talks, given by Dr. Mark Felton, will examine the true story, revealing the exploitation, massacre, theft and ecological vandalism that is too often ignored. You will hear familiar names like Custer's Last Stand, the Battle of the Little Bighorn, Wyatt Earp and Crazy Horse, but perhaps shorn of their mythical aura.

Dr. Felton has taken the title for his talks from one of the more than 20 books he has written, two of which are currently being made into Hollywood films. He has also appeared on radio and television.

The talks begin on Monday January 14th 2019 in the Jubilee Hall, George Lane, Loddon, where there is ample free parking. They continue until Monday 25th March, with a half-term break on February 18th. The fee for the ten talks will be £55; if you are undecided, come to the first talk free of charge and pay only if you continue. A great turn out for our Hedgehogs event on a sunny Saturday in October half term showed just how much we love

hedgehogs! 45 adults and 15 children enjoyed a very informative talk from Shawn Mills of the Attleborough Hedgehog Rescue, who took us through a year in the life of a hedgehog and what we can do in our gardens to help them.

Don't tidy all the garden ready for winter. Leave piles of dead leaves in a guiet corner where hedgehogs can hibernate undisturbed. If you are trimming a hedge, consider

creating a "dead hedge" or brush pile. Difficult to compost dead twigs and smaller branches can be piled in a heap or used to construct a "dead hedge" to provide a range of habitats for invertebrates and small mammals.

Remembrance. Thank you everybody for your overwhelming and magnificent support for this year's branch Poppy Appeal. We look, even at this early stage, to be well on the way to overtaking last year's generous final total of £7762.00. We had the unprecedented dilemma of actually running out of poppies for the Church Plain



poppy stall before we had even set it up, and had to beg and borrow (but not actually steal!) poppies from other branches. The Poppy Stall at Loddon Farmer's Market in October raised £118.00.

HELPING HEDGEHOGS Hedgehogs are a useful ally to gardeners in that they eat snails, slugs and other pests which can cause damage to plants. Here are one or two things we can do to give this endangered species a helping hand:

- In the Autumn keep an eye out for any small hedgehogs. Young hedgehogs weighing less than 600gms probably won't survive hibernation— if you find one try and put it in a box lined with straw if possible, or some torn up newspaper and ring PACT Animal Sanctuary 01362 820775 or the local vet for advice. (Wear a strong pair of gloves before picking up the hedgehog)
- Meat based cat or dog food, special hedgehog food, or dry cat food are great for hungry hedgehogs that need to bulk up for winter but NOT bread and milk as they can cause diarrhoea.
- They are very resourceful creatures and will make nest sites under sheds, amongst piles of wood and under mounds of leaves so it's useful to keep a part of your garden a little bit 'wild' if you want to attract hedgehogs to it.
- Before you light a bonfire, always check carefully underneath it first as this is an obvious place for a hedgehog to build its nest. Likewise, when using spades, forks, mowers and strimmers etc., be sure that you are not operating your equipment in a location where a hedgehog might be seeking refuge or hibernating. Netting can also cause problems with hedgehogs getting trapped within it. You should keep an eye on any netting which you are using to cover plants off the ground the same goes for similar material such as barbed wire.

Read Any Good Books Lately?

A merry Christmas to everyone! May the New Year bring with it a happier, more peaceful world.

"Across the Bridge," by Morag Joss

This story is thoughtful and unusual. There are three main characters, none of whom is connected to the others at the start of the book, and none of whom is happy with the way life has turned out. Gradually, in spite of their very different circumstances, they come together and the plot really develops from there.

The author has given her book a clever title - Silva, Ron and "Annabel" have to cross metaphorical bridges in order to co-exist, and there is an actual bridge across a river which plays a central part in the interesting narrative.

"Us," by David Nicholls

This book must have one of the most unusual opening chapters ever written in a novel! Us is about a couple who have been married for 24 years, and about their seventeen year old son, Albie. It's also about complex relationships: sadness, joy, love, misunderstandings, frustration and lots more. It covers the highs and lows of marriage and family life; sometimes it's very funny, sometimes very touching and sometimes very sad.

Some years ago now David Nicholls made his name with One Day. You will find that Us is just as good, if not even better.

"Archangel," by Robert Harris

The opening section of this thriller is gripping, and forms the background to everything that follows. It may, however take a little while for you to begin to understand exactly who is who and what is going on, and also to master the Russian names. Once all of these become clear for the reader the novel is utterly absorbing.

Robert Harris's ability to create an atmosphere with his writing is an extraordinary skill. The terror created by him (and felt by the reader) for Dr. Kelso is palpable. The legacy of fear from Stalin's rule in Russia is - in this book - tangible. So vivid is Harris's writing that towards the end the reader can feel the extreme cold of Archangel itself, and can almost experience with Kelso and O'Brian the dreadful dangers they face.

"This Must Be the Place," by Maggie O'Farrell

The fascinating story of an ex-film star who becomes a recluse, and of her chance meeting with a divorced man which leads to their marriage. Both already have children by their previous partners, and every individual in the book is a fascinating character, with no two being alike. Be aware that sometimes the author chops and changes from one time frame to another, which can be a bit bewildering. The period covered is 1944 to the present day, and the setting crosses several continents. Claudette's and Daniel's marriage is by no means placid, but is a real roller coaster.

This novel has an unpredictable plot, but it's wonderfully interesting!



Nature Notes

Well, another year has gone in a flash and it's December once again. Looking at the predicted weather forecast for Christmas it seems likely that, for the first time for several years, we may have a white one. If the old adage of there being an abundance of berries on the trees and bushes means that there will also be a hard winter is to be believed, this may well be true. Hawthorn in particular seem to be laden with fruit and the Hollies too. Judging from the erratic nature of this past year I guess anything is possible.

Of course the idea of snow at this time of year is always exciting, especially for children, even though heavy falls do cause upheaval in our daily lives, but it can have devastating effects on our wildlife. Small birds in particular are very vulnerable and it is important to keep your feeders well stocked to supplement their diet. Sunflower seeds seem to have been favourite in recent years, especially the hearts (the ones without the black husks). They also make far less mess on the ground. I've found that the Niger seed, that used to be popular especially with Goldfinches, has gone out of favour. I've seen feeders hanging full and untouched for weeks with the seeds sprouting, which is not a good idea to leave. Feeders like this can spread diseases and do far more harm than good.

Peanuts are still eaten by Tits and Woodpeckers but they also seem to prefer sunflower hearts. Also, if they get wet they will go mouldy, especially at the bottom of the container where it might not be noticeable.

If you are putting out scraps from the kitchen on a bird table, do make sure that it gets a good scrub at least once a week when you do your bird baths and please break any bread into small pieces. I've seen slices of white bread lying about for days with mould growing on, which is definitely a bad idea.

Fat balls are good if several are suspended in a holder from a branch or a bird table but please take them out of the plastic netting first. Many of our small garden birds have been seriously injured by getting their feet tangled up in them.

If you have any apples to hand Blackbirds and Starlings will enjoy them. Cut them in half and leave one or two a day on the grass and they will soon find them.

If you have a tree in the garden you could try smearing a small amount of peanut butter into a couple of cracks in the bark or even wedging the odd Brazil nut somewhere and you may attract a Great Spotted Woodpecker.

Of course, if you have bushes with berries and the weather is very cold you may even get a Waxwing. They particularly seem to like Guelder Rose and Rowan. Please do let me know if you see one as they are quite spectacular. Waxwing come from Scandinavia and fly south when the weather is really severe. Some years hardly any are sighted here and at other times quite large flocks have been reported. They also seem to be found eating the berries from bushes planted around supermarket car parks so you may even see one when out shopping!



Anyway, whatever the weather, do enjoy the birds that visit us. The pleasure they give far outweighs the cost and maybe you will get the chance to get some great photo shots.

As a parting thought...... please don't get too upset if, once you get to know your favourites, a Sparrowhawk swoops in and eats one. This is the natural world and they have to fight to live too. Happy Christmas and Happy Birdwatching.

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Gardening Notes

At this time of year most shrubs and tree's will become dormant and drop their leaves, usually all over your lawn, which looks a mess but more importantly they will kill off your grass. It's best to collect the leaves by running your mower over the lawn and then put them on the compost heap. or around plants and shrubs in your borders. Put a little soil over them to stop them being blown back onto your lawn. These will rot down and put some nutrients back into the soil. There is still time to apply grass seed to bare patches in your lawn, as long as the weather stays mild.

When you have given the grass its final cut, wash down your mower and dry off (make sure electric mowers are disconnected first) and store in a dry shed, and preferably get your mower serviced over the winter months. (I have time to service mowers over the winter period, but not too much time in the spring).

Bare root trees, hedging and roses are available from mid December. When you buy them make sure to plant the roots into a hole in your garden and cover, so as the roots don't dry out. You can then put the plants into their final positions at your leisure. When you plant them make sure the hole is bigger then the roots themselves, cover with some compost, and fill the rest of the hole with soil, water well, and sprinkle some bone meal around the plant.

Watch out for pests on your veg plants, especially slugs, whitefly and pigeons: they will eat your brassicas quicker than you can, so it's worth the effort to control them.

Broad beans can be sown this month, The Sutton variety is good for windy areas as it is a dwarf variety, and will stand up well to adverse conditions. For more sheltered areas the variety Aquadulce will grow well: it's a tall variety and crops very well. As with all vegetables, apply some fertiliser to get the best yield from your crop, 20.10.10 or Growmore is ideal.

At this time of year, patios, paths and driveways get very slippery and dangerous, so its important to get them cleaned. The elderly can become virtually housebound if they are too frightened to go outside for fear of slipping over. I have started a pressure washing and soft washing business to clean down all surfaces cover in algae and dirt, and once clean I can apply a treatment to stop the algae coming back again for at least a year, thus keeping the area safe, and a lot less dangerous to walk on. It will also bring the original colour back making the area look like new again. Contact me for a free quote.

Hopefully December will be mild, so we can still mess about in the garden.
