Ministerial Musings

NFW LIFF

Spring has arrived, there is more daylight, bird song and new life everywhere.

On the farm several of the cows have had their beautiful calves and the grass, wheat, barley, beans and oil seed rape are growing on now having had some much needed rain. As all gardeners and farmers everywhere will know good preparation and care are very important for all of this to happen, and there needs to be constant observation and attention to ensure healthy livestock and productive crops.

New life is all around us, buds on the trees, wild flowers, little chicks, calves and lambs. It is fascinating when the tiny ducklings follow mother duck from their nest by the pond and waddle their way down to the marshes. There is also much more going on that we don't see....in the hidden bird nests, in the undergrowth, the underground tunnels and in the streams and rivers. God's creation is wonderful.

We are now in the season of Lent in the church calendar, a time of remembering the 40 days Jesus spent fasting in the desert before beginning his ministry of teaching and healing. It is a time for us to reflect on our regard for people and the environment and to ask forgiveness for our mistakes. Many people give up certain luxuries, and some decide to give more by doing things which make a difference to other peoples' lives. On Maundy Thursday we meet to commemorate Jesus' last supper with his disciples, then on Good Friday remember that Jesus died for everyone. He was crucified and died on the cross outside Jerusalem, even though he had done nothing wrong. Then after three days Jesus was raised to life again. On the Sunday evening he stood among his disciples and showed them the wounds of his crucifixion and he said "Peace be with you". He asked for something to eat and they gave him a piece of cooked fish. Jesus said "You are witnesses of these things and I will send upon you what my Father has promised".

As we celebrate Easter again after reflection and preparation, this is when we can realise the meaning of new life for us. There is a fresh way of living now, and because of Jesus' resurrection we have new hope of everlasting life after death.

May the risen Lord bless us, watch over us and renew us as he renews the whole of creation. May our hearts and lives echo his love.




Looking ahead to the Summer

THE SISLAND CHRONICLE

Sisland is a tiny parish of around 500 acres, but from time to time it has been in the headlines. The Charles family owned most of it for a time, and Sir Edward Charles was Lord of the Manor in 1335. Whether he ever came here is a moot point, as he spent most of his time at sea, and as Admiral of the fleet was responsible for protecting our shores of much of the North Sea, from the Thames up to Berwick on Tweed, and by all accounts he did a good job. Perhaps it is a pity that he wasn't around when the Vikings caused so much trouble!

The effect of the bubonic plagues doesn't get a mention, and there don't appear to have been any trials of parishioners for witchcraft practices. However in 1761 St Mary's was hit by a thunderbolt and virtually destroyed; being rebuilt on a more modest scale, as one of the small number of Georgian 'Gothick' churches in the country, painted internally in shades of blue (Saint Mary's colour) with a ceiling of golden stars. In 2018 the churchyard gained a second bench, (the first being a memorial to members of the Hemmant and Haylock families, churchwardens for half a century), the new one, given in memory of Major General Pank who lived in the parish, by his widow. Sited near the hedge, it is a pleasant place to sit, contemplating the life of this rural parish over the millennia, or just quietly listening to nothing!

Has anyone heard of Alcmuntona. In the Hundred of Lodding. Total population: 2 households (very small). Total tax assessed 0.0 geld units (very small). Value to the lord of the manor in 1086, £1. Households: 4 free men. Now classed as a lost Village, but it was mentioned in the Doomsday survey under the heading of

Sisland.

Chernobyl Children's Life Line Chet and Waveney Link

In June this year, our fifth group of 10 children from Belarus will be staying with Host families in the Loddon and Beccles areas. The children are aged 9-10 years. There will be 7 girls and 3 boys.



Belarus suffers from the legacy of the 1986 Chernobyl disaster. 70% of the radiation from the Chernobyl accident landed on 90% of the country of Belarus affecting 1 million children. Radiation is a silent killer. You cannot see it, touch it or taste it. Cesium 137 builds up in children's bodies, compromising their immune systems meaning that they are more likely to develop fatal cancers including thyroid cancer and leukaemia. The Chernobyl Children's Life Line brings groups of children to the UK for four weeks' respite to help boost their immune systems which in turn improves their health and resistance to cancers and neurological diseases.

The children come from the poorest of families and arrive with hardly more than the clothes they stand in, so we have need of quality 'nearly new' clothing and shoes (both summer and winter) for these little boys and girls. Clothing to fit the age range of 8 to 12 years would be most appreciated. Shoe and trainer sizes 1-4.

On their return home we send them with a supply of basic but essential medicines that we take for granted but which they do not always have access at home. We will appreciate your help by donating any of the items listed here:

cold remedies - chap sticks - throat sweets, mouth ulcer ointments (suitable for under 12's), cold sore treatments - vapour rub, menthol crystals - decongestants - Calpol sachets.



The remaining business completed, the meeting continued with David Crease's report on the 6 pits dug in 2018 and hopes for 2019. Pits had been dug in Loddon, Langley School grounds and Hadiscoe Churchyard. Pictures were shown of Digs and some finds. Any help with locating pit sites around Stubbs Green would be welcomed. Elvie told us of progress with transcription of the early censuses and with Map georeferencing techniques and how the 1840 Tithe Map is now referenced to the modern OS map The use of colour enables a visual reference to the major land holdings.

Peter Smith then took the meeting and gave us a fascinating talk on his research into Beccles Road Maltings. Peter is a 'newcomer' to the village. He, together with his wife Sharon, only moved here 3 years ago when they bought a house in the converted building in Beccles Road. He started his research on the malting complex which led him back to the early 1700's. He has used documents at the Norfolk Record Office as well as material from our archive.

Early Maltsters were members of the Gardiner family, while later the property was owned by Edmund Dennis Browne and the Cannell Family. He has also found much information on the Maltings in George Lane which stood where we now have our meetings.

Along the way he has also gained much information on past residents and influential locals to add to our ever growing archive. His research notes have now been filed in the Local Studies Room with other house and building histories.

The meeting concluded with tea and also scones which were kindly supplied by Spooncake.



Read Any Good Books Lately?

Two are historical novels based on fact (but very different people, centuries and places) and one other novel which is bang up to date and, fittingly, all about books...

"Three Sisters, Three Queens," by Philippa Gregory

A really good historical novel mainly about Margaret Tudor, who - at a very young age - became the wife of James IV of Scotland, and mother of James V. Margaret was the second oldest child of Henry VII of England, younger sister to Prince Arthur and older sister to Prince Henry, who was later to become Henry VIII.

The other two women of the title are Princess Mary Tudor* who was briefly married to Louis, King of France until he died, and then went on to marry Charles Brandon, Duke of Suffolk. The third woman is, of course, Katherine of Aragon.

Throughout the book the author uses original letters from the women to each other, as well as letters from Margaret to Henry VIII. They contain fascinating details of the time.

In reading Three Sisters, Three Queens, a great deal can be learned about Scottish history prior to the time of Mary Queen of Scots and James VI. This isn't like a dry history lesson, though: anything but. If you often enjoy reading historical novels you may well find that this one breaks new ground for you. It is spellbindingly good!

*Not to be confused with Mary Tudor who became known as Bloody Mary.

"Napoleon's Lost Island," by Thomas Keneally

An extraordinary novel about Napoleon Bonaparte's last exile on the island of St, Helena. The people living on the island had to adapt to having this very famous personage living alongside them, and not just adapt to him, but to his small entourage and numerous British officials and soldiers.

The story is told from the viewpoint of the young daughter of the man whose business it is to supply provisions to Napoleon. She forms an unlikely friendship with him - as do her parents, sister and brother - and the reader could almost believe she is writing this book, not Thomas Keneally! In this novel, friendship and trust, respect for each other, kindness and sadness are all explored by Keneally, who is always a humane writer. It's certainly not the usual image of Napoleon Bonaparte that that one has.

"The Readers of Broken Wheel Recommend," by Katarina Bivald

A quirky sort of story, this. A young woman from Sweden develops a pen-friendship with an elderly lady who lives in Broken Wheel, Iowa, USA. Both love books, and Amy (the old lady from Iowa) invites Sarah (from Sweden) to come and visit her for a holiday. Sarah has some savings, so she decides to do just that. When she arrives in Broken Wheel, however, things turn out rather surprisingly...

Katarina Bivald has written this story beautifully. It has lots of unusual and eccentric characters and is highly entertaining.

Nature Notes

Whatever the weather has been like since writing this (and it was quite warm at the end of February) we now know that Spring is here again. The first day was of course,21st March, and the clocks going forward and Mother's Day too are all signs that bring it closer to mind.

Birds will already have paired up and many will have started nesting again. Rooks are always the first to begin and if you happen to be near a rookery you will have noticed the noise, at least. Unlike Crows, that nest in solitary pairs, Rooks nest together in very large groups and are clearly visible in the still bare branches of the highest trees they can find. Jackdaws tend to use sites in old buildings and are notorious for building nests in chimneys. All our favourite garden birds are nest building too. They time the hatching of their eggs to coincide with leaves bursting on the trees and the appearance of insects and caterpillars that also should be in abundance at this time. How clever is that?

Staying with birds, I was very pleased to see 3 Barn Owls hunting on Langley Marshes in February. After the previous wet spring Barn Owl numbers had plummeted so it's good to know that we still have some in the area. Barn Owls have no way of waterproofing their feathers so tend not to fly when it is wet which can make hunting for food very difficult and their young can easily starve in these conditions. Let's hope that this spring brings better weather for them and they manage to raise their chicks to increase numbers once again.

Of course, this month should see the return of Swallows, coming back to us once again from Africa to raise their chicks here. As we all know, numbers have been steadily decreasing in recent years along with many of our migrants. Let's hope that some make it this time. We all know the saying 'One swallow doesn't make a summer' - just imagine a summer with none.

If you managed to get to the meeting of the South Yare Wildlife Group on 14th March, you will now know all about the proposed 'Bee Line' project being set up by the National Conservation Group, Bug Life. As I understand it, the intention is to link existing designated wildlife areas across the country with corridors in gardens and roadside verges for insects, primarily Bees, to travel along. If this information has passed you by and you are interested please look on the South Yare website for ways you can help.

I had the news that, as Langley School needs a new connection to the main drain in Langley Road, a pipe is to be laid through the trees adjacent to the road to exit on the corner of Big Back Lane. This apparently necessitates the removal of several trees in the wood and also the rather beautiful young Beech tree that stands on the corner junction.

During my years as a tree warden, many of you will know that I worked closely and on a very regular basis with Eric Wilkinson, of Chedgrave and together we planted this tree. We spent a considerable time tending this sapling in its early years of growth as it struggled to maintain itself against the battle with the hedge behind. Now, at around 25 years old, it is a beautiful specimen about to spring to life for another year. That is, unless it's been cut down already. It seems this is a forgone conclusion. How sad is that?

Gardening Notes

After a fantastic end to February, with record breaking temperatures, the weather has now reverted back to normal spring weather, wet and windy, but relatively mild, and as we need the rain it's not too bad, as long as it's at night time. If we do get another scorching hot summer you will find that gardens that are light and sandy will really suffer, so it might be a good idea to apply some mulch around your shrubs and trees which will help retain some moisture. Farmyard manure is very good for this, as it feeds the plants as well as acting as a mulch. We sell this in bags so it's easy to handle.

Bedding and perennial plants are available to plant out now, so prepare the ground by applying some general purpose fertiliser - a handful per square metre will do - and rake it into the soil. Plant the plants and water well. Make sure the plants don't dry out for the first week or two until the roots get established, and keep the weeds under control so they don't compete with the plants for water and food.

Hardy annual flower seeds can be sown out where the plants are to flower. Make sure the soil is weed free and level, sow the seeds and rake in, making sure to cover as many seeds as possible. Apply a little water - too much will cap the soil and stop the seeds from germinating. Remove any thin plants to allow the strong plants room to grow.

In the veg garden sow main crop potatoes, peas, beans, salad crops and over wintering brassicas. The brassica plants should be planted out in late May/early June when they are about 6" tall.

If you have room in your greenhouse, sow into peat pots some runner beans, sweetcorn, pumpkins, and melons. These can be planted outside in May when its warm enough.

Tomato plants will need daily attention as the temperatures warm up. Keep the soil around the plants damp, and take off the side shoots as they appear. This will encourage the plants to grow straight, and more energy will go into producing flowers, and hence tomatoes.

Lawns are growing well and looking good. Most of the damage done by last year's drought seems to have been repaired naturally, so you just need to get rid of the moss and weeds that appear every spring. We have a great offer on weed feed and moss killer. It's only £18.99 for a 500m 2 bag, hopefully the best deal you will find anywhere.

Paths , patios and driveways that are green, dirty and slippery should be pressure washed and treated to stop the algae coming back for several months. if you can't manage this yourself give me a call as we provide a cleaning service. You can then sit outside in the warmer weather and enjoy your surroundings.
