# **Ministerial Musings**

Dear Friends,

'May you live in interesting times' says (possibly) an ancient Chinese curse. I'm writing this at the beginning of October and the times certainly are 'interesting'. Yes, it's the dreaded Brexit. Maybe by the time you read this, it will be decided one way or another- maybe not. Another old saying says never talk about politics or religion, but as someone has commented: 'Being taught to avoid talking about politics and religion has led to a lack of understanding about politics and religion. What we should have been taught was how to have a civil conversation about a difficult topic.'

One of the founders of Methodism, John Wesley lived in a very divided England, a country recovering from years of religious and political upheaval and with a great gulf between rich and poor. Sound familiar? For all those who say 'it's been like this before, we'll be alright' – yes it has, and so 'we' will – but Wesley's (and my) concern is who and what will be damaged in the process.

Wesley wrote in one of his essays: 'Though we cannot think alike, may we not love alike? May we not be of one heart, though we are not of one opinion? Without all doubt, we may. 'He was saying that we should listen to those with whom we disagree and focus on what we share in common – building bridges rather than walls, as a more recent political protest slogan goes.

The blogger Adam Hamilton writes: 'Having a spirit like Wesley's today means that we assume the best of others, not the worst. We give them the benefit of the doubt. We speak well of others, not poorly. We treat them as we hope to be treated. We listen more and talk less. We walk in other people's shoes and try to understand what they believe and why. This does not mean we give up our convictions, but it does mean we test them. '

There is a lot of work to do to bring people together, to stand for truth and justice for everyone, and to sort out where we go next for the good of us all. One of the best tools we can use to get this done is love, for our fellow human beings and for ourselves (and for God of course, I'm a Minister so I have to say that as I believe it to be true). To finish, here is a quick reminder of what love is – this sort of love truly can change the world – and even the political landscape if we let it. 'Love is patient. Love is kind. Love isn't jealous. It doesn't sing its own praises. It isn't arrogant. It isn't rude. It doesn't think about itself. It isn't irritable. It doesn't keep track of wrongs. It isn't happy when injustice is done, but it is happy with the truth. Love never stops being patient, never stops believing, never stops hoping, never gives up. (1 Corinthians chapter 13 verses 4-7 God's Word translation.)

# THE SISLAND CHRONICLE

Perhaps we shouldn't grumble – in a year or two the parish could feature in a period drama! 

#### Loddon & District Local History Group

The Tithe Wars in 1930's East Anglia, a talk by Robert Halliday

Remembering a story told to him as a child, by his father, of how farmers in the 1930's refused to pay the tithe, set Robert Halliday off on a research project that revealed just how farmers in East Anglia protested over paying this tax; something that became known as The Tithe Wars. The system, that went back centuries, meant that even small landowners were legally obliged to give a tenth of their produce to the church. Later, an agreement with local clergy, allowed the payment to be made in cash. As time passed and industrialisation flourished less people worked on the land, not all those who did attended the Anglican Church, and the agricultural depression of the 1930's brought hardship to rural communities so farmers refused to pay. Landowners were sent to court and goods ordered to be sold off, However, auctioneers did not want to be seen selling off the things farmers needed to make a living and life became very dificult for them or the balifs if they did. Implements only sold for a shilling or two, usually bought buy neighbours who promptly loaned them back to the original owners. Roads and pathways leading to a farm sale were blocked with machinery and 'necessary' work like tree cutting, just happened to be taking place that day, all too close for safety. As the newspaper cuttings and photographs Robert showed us revealed, there was no end to the ingenuty that caused disruption and brought attention to their plight.

Following a government investigation the system changed to one where 'rent' was paid on the land, reducing by 5% each year, ending in 1980. At Elmset in Suffolk next to the church, a memorial can still be seen to The Tithe Wars. This was a very interesting talk on an important but mostly forgotten event in our rural history.

Have you ever thought about how, after the end of the first world war, the body of an unidentified soldier had been selected to represent all the many other unidentified soldiers who were killed in that war? The body was brought back to London and, in a dignified ceremony on 11th November 1920, was re-buried in Westminster Abbey in what we all know as the tomb of the unknown warrior. In this novel Anna Hope links the stories of three women - each very different - ultimately to the day of that ceremony.

These three women have different reasons for needing to let go of the past, or to help someone they love to do so. If/when you read this beautiful book you will become absorbed in their stories. It's a very moving novel, dealing as it does with the whole appalling business of war and the effect it has, not just on those who fight, but also on those who have to pick up the pieces afterwards.

# "My Dear, I Wanted to Tell You;" "The Heroes' Welcome:" "Devotion," by Louisa Young

A trilogy of three sensitive, beautifully written books which cover the years from the beginning of World War I through the next twenty years and on to the imminence of World War II. Family, love, friendship and politics all inhabit each of the three novels. All very well worth reading (but read them in their correct order).

# "Michael Morpurgo: War Child to War Horse," by Maggie Fergusson

Not a novel but an enthralling biography of this amazing author of children's books. Amazing because he has written more than 120 books, nearly all for children, and has become one of the most well-known and much loved children's authors. (He is also a poet and playwright). In addition he was made the third Children's Laureate in 2003 and in 2011 he gave the 35th annual Richard Dimbleby Lecture, choosing for his title "Set the Children Free." More recently he had the honour of becoming Sir Michael Morpurgo.

Prior to all of these things, in 1976 he and his wife, Clare, started the charity "Farms for City Children" in the village of Iddesleigh, in Devon. The charity has grown considerably since then and consists of four farms in different parts of the UK. Of course this gentle, caring and talented man is most well-known generally because he wrote War Horse, which became such a success on stage at the Royal National Theatre and which was later made into a film.

We learn a lot about the young Michael and the years of his growing-up in this biography by Maggie Fergusson, as well as about his older and more famous years. She has done her research well and has produced an excellent book which gives us the real essence of her subject.

#### Nature Notes

At the beginning of October, as we made our way to our car, Rachel exclaimed "look up there", quickly searching the sky I saw a Red Kite

gliding over our neighbors' trees. That same evening at dusk as I was standing at the bottom of our garden listening to Tawny Owls calling while looking across the marshes. Then to my delight one of the Tawny Owls flew right in front of me. At the same time, a pipistrelle bat appeared, which was the first bat, which was the first bat I'd seen in a long time. Similarly, a week earlier I almost tripped over a hedgehog in our garden at dusk, again the first alive one I have seen this year

During September it was noticeable that our Blackbirds were very much absent, as they hid while they went through their molt. On the other hand, there seemed to be Robins singing from every bush. Another bird that has been very visible recently is the normally secretive Jay, a more colourful member of the crow family. Their flying action always reminds me of someone swimming using the butterfly stroke. They can be seen flying between oak trees collecting acorns to bury usually singularly, for the winter. Amazingly, they can remember where they have hidden most of them when food is scarce. Along with Jays, Grey Squirrels are also abundant, busily collecting food to store for winter. For a while one visited our neighbors' hazel tree gathering nuts and storing some in our chickens' nest box.

Walking the dogs on Chedgrave Common the other weekend I found a large fungus which while surveying there we hadn't come across. Fortunately, I had my phone with me so took a photograph and it was identified as a probable Giant Funnel. Norfolk Wildlife Trusts survey work on commons has now come to an end. They plan to collate the information gathered from around Norfolk and draw up action plans for the commons surveyed. Already the Broads authority are cutting bracken once a year to try and stop its spread and give other plants a chance to survive.

A couple of times during September I made my way to Minsmere to see what was around and was rewarded with good views of little stints, curlew sandpipers and a pectoral sandpiper, the latter is an American wader that has got blown over here.

While cutting nettles out of a ditch I discovered a harvest mouse nest beautifully constructed of grasses and lined with thistle down. I have only ever seen a harvest mouse once many years ago. When we had parked in a layby on route from Bristol to Peterborough, one was climbing through the tall grass at the edge of the adjoining field.

I may well have to wait until next year to see spotted flycatchers, which will be on route back to Africa by now. Hopefully I will see some of the warblers that breed in Northern Europe that can drop off along our coastline on their way to sunnier climes. We did fail to catch up with yellow browed warblers which had been around Sparrows Nest Park in Lowestoft, but we enjoyed the walk through the trees.

**Gardening Notes** 

As I sit writing these gardening notes, it is pouring with rain, and has been for the past 12 hours, some damage has been

done locally but overall it is much needed, hopefully with our usual rain fall over the winter, the ground water levels will be ok for next year, because as it was we were heading for hosepipe bans for next summer, which non of us would have wanted. On wet days it's a good idea to get in the greenhouse and dispose of any old plants, leaves and general plant debris, wash down the frame and glass with a disinfectant to kill off any diseases and if you find any bugs kill them off with a pest killing smoke bomb. Dig over any bare soil and everything will be ready for an early start to the season next year.

If the weather stays mild it would be a good idea to apply an autumn feed and moss killer to your lawn, this will get the grass into a good condition for the winter, and off to a good start in the spring.

When you have finished cutting the grass for the season, clean down your mower and wipe over with an oily rag, and please have it serviced over the winter months, when I have time to do the work, as we get very busy in the spring.

On dry days you can cut the hedges, prune herbaceous plants down to about 18", take out any dead wood from perennial plants, and prune to reduce size if needed.

In the veg garden, keep a look out for pests and diseases, slugs will be around in numbers after this wet weather, so pick them off the plants and dispose of, whitefly look harmless enough, but if left they can decimate a brassica crop in a matter of weeks, and probably the worst pest is the wood pigeon, so you might have to put a net over the brassica crops especially if the weather turns cold.

Aqua dulce broad beans should be planted this month, these are tall variety which crop well, if you are growing the beans in an exposed part of the garden it might be best to plant the variety called The Sutton, these are a dwarf variety and will stand up to strong winds, if it's mild, plant the beans later in the month, if it's cold you can plant them earlier, this will make sure the beans are not too long and lanky as they go into the winter, long thin plants will suffer if we get any really sharp frosts.

If the weather turns cold and icy make sure to have some rock salt stored in the garage, spread the salt onto the ice and within minutes the ice will dissolve and the sand in the mix will give you some extra grip when you walk on the surface.

Keep your wellie boots and rain coats by the back door, winter is coming!
