A thought for Monday in Holy Week

Today is the first day of Holy Week when we begin a journey following Jesus to his death on the cross.

Yesterday we celebrated Palm Sunday and remembered Jesus riding into Jerusalem, where a large crowd of his disciples began to praise him in loud voices saying, "God bless the king who comes in the name of the Lord!"
