# New Testament Reading: Philippians 1:3-11

I thank my God every time I remember you, constantly praying with joy in every one of my prayers for all of you, because of your sharing in the gospel from the first day until now. # Gospel Reading: Luke 3:1-6

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke. Glory to you, O Lord.

In the fifteenth year of the reign of Emperor Tiberius, when Pontius Pilate was governor of Judea, and Herod was ruler of Galilee, and his brother Philip ruler of the region of Ituraea and Trachonitis, and Lysanias ruler of Abilene, during the high-priesthood of Annas and Caiaphas, the word of God came to John son of Zechariah in the wilderness. He went into all the region around the Jordan, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins, as it is written in the book of the words of the prophet Isaiah,

'The voice of one crying out in the wilderness: "Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight. Every valley shall be filled, and every mountain and hill shall be made low, and the crooked shall be made straight, and the rough ways made smooth; and all flesh shall see the salvation of God."

This is the Gospel of the Lord. Praise to you, O Christ.

## Talk [Rev David]

Don't shoot the messenger! Yet how often have they been despatched? Many years ago I read L P Hartley's novel "The Go-Between". The novel, written in 1953, and set in Norfolk, casts a critical eye over late Victorian society through the eyes of a naive teenager. Many may well have read it too or seen an adaptation of the book on screen or stage. Leo, whilst staying in Brandham Hall becomes the messenger between his upper class school friend's sister, Marian and Ted, the tenant farmer. The postman in their socially illicit relationship. Like many messengers Leo had no idea what the letters he delivered said.

The big difference between Leo then and the messengers we encounter in our readings today is that they did know what their message was and therefore were at pains to make it known. Nothing clandestine about them. The link between the reading in Malachi and Luke is quite clear.

The Malachi reading needs to be read in its context. There's an argument going on between the people and God. The people can't see beyond their noses. They wonder what it is that they have done to weary God. Malachi challenges them that they have called into question God's character and they in turn challenge God's interpretation of justice. It is in response to that statement that these words are uttered. A direct rebuttal and even a threat that there is going to come a time when God will send his Messenger and the people will live to regret their attitude.

The passage from Luke comes in as a direct connection. The Messenger has arrived—John, the Baptiser. Yet Luke is at pains to point out that John is the Messenger not the message. The actual message of God to his people and to the world is Jesus. The Messenger knows the Message though. He is clear in its proclamation and as we discover is aware that his role is to bring the Message to the people. John was a voice, actually The Voice, crying out in the wilderness: Prepare the way of the Lord.

We know about John—he has a name. His proclamation is for a particular moment. Malachi's message could have been at any point in the people's

history. And the irony is that the name Malachi comes from the Hebrew for 'messenger', therefore we can't say with certainty if it was his actual name!

Today we have looked at two prophets—people who foretell but primarily forth-tell. On this second Sunday of Advent we remember them all. We have recorded names for the biblical prophets; yet many others also have been called to proclaim a message. Let us not forget that the role of the Prophet is to pass on a message—the prime message being Jesus Christ, the embodiment of the Message. As St John writes: 'The Word made flesh.' The prophets of today are called to share that Good News; to challenge the world and also to live in it, so that they—we—may practice what we preach.

#### **Affirmation of Faith**
