Our Lord's Summary of the Law

Our Lord Jesus Christ said, Hear, O Israel, the Lord our God is one Lord; and thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind, and with all thy strength. This is the first commandment.

And the second is like, namely this: thou shalt love thy neighbour as thyself. There is none other commandment greater than these.

On these two commandments hang all the law and the prophets.

Lord have mercy upon us, and write both these thy laws in our hearts, we beseech thee.

OT Reading: Zephaniah 3:14—end

Sing aloud, O daughter Zion; shout, O Israel! Rejoice and exult with all your heart, O daughter Jerusalem! The Lord has taken away the judgements against you, he has turned away your enemies. The king of Israel, the Lord, is in your midst; you shall fear disaster no more. On that day it shall be said to Jerusalem: Do not fear, O Zion; do not let your hands grow weak.

The Lord, your God, is in your midst, a warrior who gives victory; he will rejoice over you with gladness, he will renew you in his love; he will exult over you with loud singing as on a day of festival.

I will remove disaster from you, so that you will not bear reproach for it. I will deal with all your oppressors at that time. And I will save the lame and gather the outcast, and I will change their shame into praise and renown in all the earth.

At that time, I will bring you home, at the time when I gather you; for I will make you renowned and praised among all the peoples of the earth, when I restore your fortunes before your eyes, says the Lord.

Let all mortal flesh keep silence, And with fear and trembling stand; Ponder nothing earthly-minded, For with blessing in his hand, Christ our God to earth descendeth, Our full homage to demand.

King of kings, yet born of Mary, As of old on earth he stood, Lord of lords, in human vesture, In the body and the blood, He will give to all the faithful His own self for heav'nly food.

Rank on rank, the host of heaven Spreads its vanguard on the way, As the light of light descendeth From the realms of endless day, That the pow'rs of hell may vanish As the darkness clears away.

The Gospel: Luke 3.7-18

The Holy Gospel is written in the third chapter of Luke beginning at the seventh verse.

Glory to thee O Lord.

John said to the crowds that came out to be baptized by him, 'You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the wrath to come? Bear fruits worthy of repentance. Do not begin to say to yourselves, "We have

Abraham as our ancestor"; for I tell you, God is able from these stones to raise up children to Abraham. Even now the axe is lying at the root of the trees; every tree therefore that does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire."

And the crowds asked him, 'What then should we do?' In reply he said to them, 'Whoever has two coats must share with anyone who has none; and whoever has food must do likewise.' Even tax-collectors came to be baptized, and they asked him, 'Teacher, what should we do?' He said to them, 'Collect no more than the amount prescribed for you.' Soldiers also asked him, 'And we, what should we do?' He said to them, 'Do not extort money from anyone by threats or false accusation, and be satisfied with your wages.'

As the people were filled with expectation, and all were questioning in their hearts concerning John, whether he might be the Messiah, John answered all of them by saying, 'I baptize you with water; but one who is more powerful than I is coming; I am not worthy to untie the thong of his sandals. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire. His winnowingfork is in his hand, to clear his threshing-floor and to gather the wheat into his granary; but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire.'

So, with many other exhortations, he proclaimed the good news to the people.

This is the Gospel of the Lord. Praise be to Thee, O Christ.

The Creed

I believe in one God the Father Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, and of all things visible and invisible: and in one Lord Jesus Christ, the only begotten Son of God, begotten of his Father before all worlds, God of God, Light of Light, very God of very God, begotten, not made, being of one substance with the Father, by whom all things were made; who for us men and our salvation came down from heaven, and was incarnate by the Holy Ghost of the Virgin Mary and was made man, and was crucified also for us under Pontius Pilate.

He suffered and was buried, and the third day he rose again according to the Scriptures, and ascended into heaven, and sitteth on the right hand of the Father.

And he shall come again with glory to judge both the quick and the dead: whose kingdom shall have no end.

And I believe in the Holy Ghost, the Lord and giver of life, who with the Father and the Son together, is worshipped and glorified, who spake by the prophets.

And I believe one catholic and apostolic church. I acknowledge one baptism for the remission of sins.

And I look for the resurrection of the dead, And the life of the world to come. Amen.

Sermon [Rev Ros]

John the Baptist was a strange man. He was a miracle baby born to Zechariah and Elizabeth in their old age, promised by God. It seems that from an early age he lived on his own in the harsh Judean desert, clothed in camel hair and existing on locusts and wild honey. I would think he was unkempt and rather wild. He was the sort who would call a spade a shovel! But he was born for a purpose. He was to prepare the way for Jesus the Messiah. Before a king visited a place he sent his heralds to make sure the road was clear, rocks removed and potholes filled in, so that the king and his entourage could travel smoothly.

He was to be the one foretold by Isaiah, the one who would go before God's chosen one, the one who would cry out in the desert.

In some verses before our reading Luke is at great pains to place John at a particular time in history. "In the fifteenth year of the reign of Tiberius Caesar—when Pontius Pilate was governor of Judea, Herod tetrarch of Galilee, his brother Philip tetrarch of Iturea and Traconitis, and Lysanias tetrarch of Abilene—during the high-priesthood of Annas and Caiaphas, the word of God came to John son of Zechariah in the wilderness."

This is important because Luke is saying this is when it happened and John didn't start his ministry until the time was right. None of these rulers was particularly pleasant or moral. In fact they were downright cruel and corrupt. John lived under the rule of some of these men and it was against this background that he started preaching and baptising. He wasn't afraid to condemn Herod as a sinner for marrying his brother's wife, even though John was imprisoned for it.

Word got round that there was a fiery preacher proclaiming a message of repentance, and baptising, in the wilderness. Could he be a prophet? There had been none in Israel for centuries.

People came out to the desert to find him but if they were looking for a comfortable message they were in for a shock.

As a sign of repentance, John expected them to be baptised and to change their lives. Gentile converts to the Jewish faith were baptised but John was expecting Jews to be baptised!

"You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the wrath to come?" Not exactly how to make friends and influence people. John continued "it's no use saying", 'We have Abraham as our ancestor' so we're alright, and count on that to save you." That will cut no ice with God because he wants to see proof of repentance. It's not enough to say sorry. It's got to be meant and your life changed from doing bad things to doing good.

To us he might say it's no good counting on going to church, reading your Bible and saying your prayers, if you neglect the needs of others, or cheat in your workplace. A true believer doesn't just talk about faith but lives it, day by day.

It reminds me of times when you say to a child that something they've done wasn't nice and to say sorry. The child dutifully says sorry but being made to say sorry isn't the same as recognising the need to apologise. And you can't be sure that they wont do it again.

Interestingly, the crowds ask John what they should do and his answers throw light on to the way some people lived then. If you have a spare coat, give one away to someone who hasn't got one. The same with extra food. Share it out.

Even tax collectors and soldiers came to John. What about us? Collect only what is due and to the soldiers, likely to be Herod's men, don't use your

power and strength to intimidate people into giving you money. Be honest in all your dealings.

All of this got the crowds into a pitch of excitement. Could this be the Messiah? John takes no praise or glory for himself but deflects their attention away from himself towards Jesus. One is coming whose sandals he is not fit to undo. John says he is lower that the lowest slave who would normally do this task. The one who is coming will baptise with the Holy Spirit and with fire. When he comes there will be judgement. Like the farmer, he will separate the wheat from the chaff. He is no tame Messiah, like Aslan in the Narnia Chronicles, he is no tame lion.

Does John have anything to say to us? What would he say if he walked down our high streets, especially at this time of the year? Would he cry out against consumerism and extravagance? What would he say about the on -going homelessness? He was against exploitation and injustice and as he was speaking of one who when he came preached that the Kingdom of God had come, we can be sure that that kingdom is also concerned with these things.

As we continue on our way to Bethlehem, John's call of repentance is for each of us and our response is to turn around and make changes in our lives. It's a call to be honest with ourselves and with God and to allow him to take us in new directions.

On Jordan's bank the Baptist's cry Announces that the Lord is nigh; Come then and hearken, for he brings Glad tidings of the King of kings.

Then cleansed be every Christian breast, And furnished for so great a guest! Yea, let us each our hearts prepare For Christ to come and enter there.

For thou art our salvation, Lord, Our refuge and our great reward; Without thy grace our souls must fade, And wither like a flower decayed. Stretch forth thine hand to heal our sore, And make us rise, to fall no more; Once more upon thy people shine, And fill the world with love divine.

All praise, eternal Son, to thee Whose advent sets thy people free, Whom, with the Father, we adore, And Spirit blest, for evermore. Amen.



Let us pray for the whole state of Christ's church militant here in earth.

Almighty and ever-living God, who by thy holy apostle hast taught us to make prayers and supplications, and to give thanks, for all men:

And we also bless thy holy name for all thy servants departed this life in thy faith and fear; beseeching thee to give us grace so to follow their good examples, that with them we may be partakers of thy heavenly kingdom: grant this, O Father, for Jesus Christ's sake, our only mediator and advocate. **Amen.**

Ye that do truly and earnestly repent you of your sins, and are in love and charity with your neighbours, and intend to lead a new life, following the commandments of God, and walking from henceforth in his holy ways: draw near with faith, and take this holy sacrament to your comfort; and make your humble confession to Almighty God, meekly kneeling upon your knees.

Almighty God, Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, maker of all things, Judge of all men: we acknowledge and bewail our manifold sins and wickedness, which we from time to time most grievously have committed, by thought, word, and deed, against thy divine majesty, provoking most justly thy wrath and indignation against us.

We do earnestly repent, and are heartily sorry for these our misdoings; the remembrance of them is grievous unto us; the burden of them is intolerable. Have mercy upon us, have mercy upon us, most merciful Father; for thy Son our Lord Jesus Christ's sake, forgive us all that is past; and grant that we may ever hereafter serve and please thee in newness of life, to the honour and glory of thy Name; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Almighty God, our heavenly Father, who of his great mercy hath promised forgiveness of sins to all them that with hearty repentance and true faith turn unto him; have mercy upon you; pardon and deliver you from all your sins; confirm and strengthen you in all goodness; and bring you to everlasting life; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

and to drink his blood, that our sinful bodies
may be made clean by his body,
and our souls washed through his most precious blood,
and that we may evermore dwell in him, and he in us. Amen.

Almighty God, our heavenly Father, who of thy tender mercy didst give thine only Son Jesus Christ to suffer death upon the cross for our redemption; who made there (by his one oblation of himself once offered) a full, perfect, and sufficient sacrifice, oblation, and satisfaction, for the sins of the whole world; and did institute, and in his holy Gospel command us to continue, a perpetual memory of that his precious death, until his coming again:

Hear us, O merciful Father, we most humbly beseech thee; and grant that we receiving these thy creatures of bread and wine, according to thy Son our Saviour Jesus Christ's holy institution, in remembrance of his death and passion, may be partakers of his most blessed body and blood: who, in the same night that he was betrayed, took Bread; and, when he had given thanks, he brake it, and gave it to his disciples, saying, Take, eat; this is my Body which is given for you: Do this in remembrance of me.
