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## Ministerial Musings

As the deadline for material to be published in Chet Contact is the eighth of the month, I'm writing this on Easter Eve. It seems strange to be looking forward to next month when we've only just started April but time passes quickly and before we know it, it will be May. Two important dates in the churches calendar this year occur during May. One of them is Ascension Day, when we celebrate Jesus' return to heaven as king. It is the fortieth day of Easter and marks the end of the Easter season. During those forty days, we remember and reflect on the appearances that Jesus made to his disciples. Ascension Day is celebrated on a Thursday, this year the 12<sup>th</sup>, and because there's no holiday or gifts and cards associated with it in this country, it passes most of us by. This is a pity because if Jesus hadn't returned to heaven, he would not have been able to form relationships with people through the ages. Neither would he have been able to empower his disciples with the Holy Spirit.



We remember this at Pentecost, fifty days after Easter; this year on the 23<sup>rd</sup> May. Christmas, Easter and Pentecost are the three main Christian festivals and I would guess that Pentecost is the least well known. Several followers of Jesus. had gathered in the upper room in Jerusalem when the whole place was filled with a sound like rushing wind and tongues of fire appeared on each head. The change in the disciples was even more dramatic! No longer afraid, Peter addressed the large crowd, telling them about Jesus and many believed what he said. This was the beginning of the gospel spreading beyond Jerusalem to eventually the whole world. It's still spreading because Jesus is alive and sends his Spirit still. This is why Pentecost is often called the birthday of the church.

## Worship in the Chet Valley

You are welcome to join us at any of our services.

Holy Communion is celebrated every Sunday at one or other of the Chet Valley Churches, either Book of Common Prayer or Common Worship, with an informal Holy Communion service once a month in Chedgrave.

Chedgrave Parish Council held a virtual meeting on 1st April 2021.

Grebe Drive Play Area: The play area is open and has been enjoyed by many children already! Many thanks to all involved in funding and delivering this facility.

The Pits: Wildflower seeds, donated by the B-Line, have been planted and should provide a pretty display in the area and habitat for insects.

Neighbourhood Plan: Four individuals were nominated to represent Chedgrave in the joint plan. Any further members of the public interested in helping are encouraged to contact the Clerk.

A146 Junction: Julian Fonseka, NCC - Network Safety & Sustainability, provided an update on proposed junction changes. The aim is to improve junction safety. However, the scheme will not provide breaks in traffic to ease Chedgrave traffic joining the A146 to Norwich during busy times which councillors expressed as the key issue.

Donations and Grants: The council awarded various amounts to Chedgrave PCC, Three Rivers Community Gym, NARS, EACH and Chedgrave MS Therapy Centre.

Footway Lighting: Councillors agreed to source electricity via "SSE Green" a 100% renewable energy tariff.

**Wherryman's Way:** Efforts continue to reinstate the path. Concern was raised at the state of the mast at the Common and this will be followed up.

Planning Matters: Three planning applications were considered:

2121/0372 – Land adjacent "Wayside", Pits Lane – the council opposed this application because it is outside the development boundary, within the conservation area, over-develops the site and will be overshadowed by "Wayside".

2021/0522 – 28 Proctor Rd – the council opposed this application because it over develops the plot, is an unattractive frontage, is overpowering and out of character. BA/2021/0097/FUL – 21c Church Close - approved, no comment.

It was noted that the following planning matters had been approved by SNC:

2019/1465 - White Horse Plain improvements - approved 11th March 2021.

## Notes from Sisland

As we emerge from the colder weather—and it is snowing as I write this—the farming year continues upon its cycle. Spring emerges from the cold of winter as the soil is being prepared for the coming season, and we can appreciate the noise of birdsong in the air. For the organic vegetable grower in Sisland the hungry gap is a beautiful time but also a difficult time of year. Called the hungry gap as we come to the end of the winter vegetables and little is yet ready to harvest from the field. A challenge for growers everywhere.



May, in Sisland, is also the ideal opportunity to visit Sisland Carr. A small wood of mixed trees and managed by the Woodland Trust. There are a couple of paths which circulate around the trees and make for a very pleasant stroll. The wood contains a conifer plantation as well as some stunning mature beech and oak. The site has also recorded some locally rare moths and noctule bats and you can often see rabbits and deer. If you visit you will be able to see the fenced plots which are being used to assess the impact of the deer and rabbits on the vegetation and regeneration of the undergrowth. At this time of year, the area is known for its stunning display of bluebells and in previous years these have been highlighted by some of the national newspapers for the stunning display. A true carpet of vivid colour. There is road access up to Sisland Carr and a small car park, but, as many will be aware, the access road is quite variable so care is required.

May is also an important month for St Mary's as we are hoping to hold our Annual Friends Service on Sunday 16<sup>th</sup> May at 5:00pm, which will be a service of Evening Prayer. This provides us an opportunity to say thank you to the Friends of St Mary, as well as an opportunity to update members on the work that has been undertaken in the previous twelve months and to discuss planned work required on the tower. If you would like to know more about the Friends of St Mary, which is an organisation which supports the work of preserving and maintaining the building, then please contact the secretary (family.bryce@btopenworld.com) who would be happy to send you further information. As well as the Friends service we also have an annual newsletter to keep everyone up to date with work planned as well as other events in the village. We are certainly hoping that our August teas will also be possible later this year, something that many people missed last year.

## Norfolk Swift Response Service



Our Norfolk Swift Response Service is available 24/7 by calling 0344 800 8020 and choose option 1 when prompted. Swift Response provides help, support and reassurance when someone has an urgent, unplanned need at home but doesn't need the emergency services. The Swift Response team can assist with emergency care needs if, for example, your usual carer is suddenly unavailable. If you have fallen, but are not injured, the team can use special lifting equipment to help make moving as safe as possible. Staff wear Personal Protective Equipment and social distancing measures are also used where appropriate to minimise the risk of infection to staff and those they are supporting. Can you help us share this information with friends and family who may be vulnerable?

## Electric and Hybrid Cars

One of the things that I (Alison) relished during the first lockdown was the clean air. With precious few cars driving around it was really noticeable. Since then, I have noticed some hybrid and some fully electric vehicles on the road and so have asked two owners for their views on their cars:

I've been driving a battery electric car since last June—and I love it! It's a Renault Zoe with a range of about 240 miles in Summer and 180 miles in Winter. It cost me about £28,000 (no part exchange for my old clapped-out car), which is quite a lot, though cheaper running costs and maintenance bills will make up for that over time. I can't have a home charger but the charge points on Church Plain are good; I can charge my battery from nearly empty to full in about two and a half hours.

The ecological benefits are well-known: no carbon dioxide emitted; no particulate emissions to choke passing pedestrians (not quite true—there are still some emissions from tyres) and no noise pollution (people often comment on how quiet it is, even with the artificial noise it generates when going at under 20 mph). Indeed, I have to admit that I sometimes feel a little smug when driving it. I accept that smugness is not an attractive quality but it's definitely better than those nagging twinges of guilt I felt when driving my old diesel.

But the best thing of all is that my Zoe is such fun to drive. It's smooth and quiet and power is instantly available. Put your foot down and you are pushed back in your seat immediately. It's no Tesla but it still packs quite a punch. And there are no gears to worry about, just forward and back, so hill starts are a doddle.

Would I go back to an internal combustion engine? Certainly not: I can't think of even one reason to do so.

Buying a second-hand car in lockdown and physically unseen was unnerving, but deciding to make the leap to either a hybrid or a fully electric car made it doubly so. I did a lot of research and finally plumped for a hybrid: Volkswagen Golf GTE (2017). I was nervous about moving to fully electric but I needn't have been and am massively reassured that when I move to electric everything will be fine.

The first misconception I had was that a special charger was required—it wasn't—and the car takes about three hours to fully charge from zero using an ordinary outdoor socket, and works in the rain too. Obviously, it would be quicker to have a dedicated fast charger installed. It locks onto the car so it can't be stolen without the key. The second was the range of up to 28-30 miles (less when you are using electricity for heating or wipers), which proved to be more than sufficient for most of our journeys to Beccles, Bungay or Norwich. The battery came with a warranty of 8 years or 100,000 miles.

The car has two sets of dials on view for electric and petrol so you can see usage of both and gives you a number of options: Electric or Petrol only; Hybrid—which Volkswagen recommend as the most economical; and self-charging—which seems to use up the petrol quickly.

My home electricity cost has gone up, but much less than petrol has come down. Now to save up for solar panels!

## Holy Trinity Bell Ringers Out of Lockdown!

Many people have said how much they miss the bells and we are happy to announce that following government guidance from 21<sup>st</sup> June we should be back to full ringing for the Sunday service and Tuesday practice nights. We will be able to ring from 17<sup>th</sup> May but will be restricted to six ringers so will only be able to ring six bells on Sundays before the service. We will still not be able to hold practice nights. However, ringers who have not touched a bell for a year need to practice a little before full ringing resumes in June so we will be arranging short practices of half hour with just six ringers (keeping to the covid rules) from 17<sup>th</sup> May. When you hear these short practices you will know that we are getting ready to serve the community again. Thanks for your support.

## No Mow May

The charity Plantlife are asking us to leave our lawns uncut throughout May to allow wildflowers and bees to flourish. If you wish you can then join in the next step of counting the flowers between 22<sup>nd</sup>-31<sup>st</sup> May.



Previously these counts have shown:

- The highest production of flowers and nectar sugar was on lawns cut once every four weeks. This gives 'short-grass' plants like daisies and white clover a chance to flower in profusion, boosting nectar production tenfold.
- Areas of longer unmown grass were, however, more diverse in their range of flowers, with other nectar-rich plants like oxeye daisy, field scabious and knapweed increasing the range of nectar sources for different pollinators and extending nectar availability into late summer.
- Every Flower Counts found that 80% of lawns supported the equivalent of around 400 bees a day from the nectar sugar produced by flowers such as dandelion, white clover and selfheal. But 20% of lawns (dubbed "superlawns") were found to be supporting 10 times as many—up to 4000 bees a day.





#### Loddon and District Local History Group

Those of you who walk in the churchyard will have seen the sad sight of the storm damage during the winter. Amongst the casualties a fallen branch from the cedar has damaged the large white Celtic cross which had to be repaired after Storm Doris about five years ago. The family members named are the Reverend John James Smith, Vicar of Loddon between 1849 and his death in December 1883, his young daughter Agnes who died in 1851, son Charles and daughter in law Marion with their three daughters.

Until 1888 Loddon had no vicarage, so the Rev Smith bought Loddon House as his home when he married in 1849 and took up his new post. He had previously been an academic at Caius College, Cambridge. He was the fourth son of Joseph Smith of Shortgrove Park in Essex. Joseph, from Coltishall, had been Private Secretary to William Pitt amongst other senior posts. Joseph's wife, The Honourable Margaret Cocks, was a niece of Charles Lord Somers. Joseph's younger sons made careers in the church and the law, while the eldest, William Charles Smith, inherited the Shortgrove Estate.

Rev Smith's second son Charles Mitford Smith changed his name by deed poll in 1911 to Charles Mitford Heriz-Smith, hence Charles, his wife and daughters appear as Heriz-Smith on the memorial.

Charles Heriz-Smith EDP Funeral Report in 1936

Mr. Charles Mitford Heriz-Smith, who died at Four Winds Kessingland, on June 28th, was buried at Loddon Churchyard on Saturday. He was 80 years of age, and was the second son of the late Rev. John James Smith who was vicar of Loddon from 1849 to 1883. Mr. Heriz-Smith was educated at Haileybury and Cooper's Hill, and afterwards entered the Indian Civil Service, Public Works Department. For a number of years he has lived at Kessingland. He leaves a widow and three daughters. His only son, Denzil Heriz-Smith, served as Lieutenant in the Northants Regiment, and was killed at the battle of the Somme. His eldest brother, the Rev. Ernest Heriz-Smith, was Fellow and Dean of Pembroke College, Cambridge. The Vicar of Loddon (the Rev. Richard Dixon) officiated The family present were Mrs. C. M. Heriz-Smith (widow), the Misses Joan, Sybil, and Gillian Heriz-Smith (daughters), Mrs. E. C. Ransome (sister), Mr. E. C. Ransome (brother-in-law), Miss R. Johnston, and Miss J. Johnston, Mr. C. Johnston, and Mr. and Mrs. W. de L. Devereux. Mr. G. Scolefield (nephew) was unable to attend. Amongst others present were Miss Rodwell, an old friend of the family, the Rev. F. W. Emms (Rector of Kessingland). Mr. John Davy,...

The daughters, who had variously been teachers of dancing and dramatic art and an artist continued living in Kessingland until their deaths.

The Rev Smith died at Hampton-on-Thames, but his widow, Agnes, moved to Cornwall where she died in 1897, and she is buried in Ruan Helston Cornwall.

#### Read Any Good Books Lately?

#### "One Breath Away," by Heather Gudenkauf

Set in the USA in the winter, this is a tense story about a hostage situation at a high school in a rural area of America. Two children are sent to live with their grandparents a long way from home because of a fire in their own home, which has caused severe burns for their mother. She is far too ill to look after the children and is scheduled to be in hospital for a long time. Life becomes very different for them while living on their grandparents' dairy farm and, of course, while there they have to attend the local school. One day, however, a man with a gun walks into the school...

This thriller is well written and the tension in such a situation comes through loud and clear. It is definitely a page turner.

#### "Light Perpetual," by Francis Spufford

A very unusual and cleverly written novel, which begins with the bombing in 1944 of a branch of Woolworths in an area of London. Shopworkers, customers, adults and children are killed and the Woolworths building and others nearby are decimated. After describing this event, the author goes on to think about five of the children and imagines what their lives would have held for them, had this terrible thing not happened. Turn by turn he gives each of the children a separate chapter for each decade. It is a fascinating way to have written a book and a really imaginative one, too. For any reader old enough to remember the post-war years through the decades up until 2009, many memories will be revived. For those readers who are younger, there is plenty to interest them and enjoy in the disparate characters and events created by Francis Spufford. 'Light Perpetual' is a delightful book, well worth reading.

#### "The Dig," by John Preston

"The Dig" is a novel based on the real life story of the Sutton Hoo\* discoveries. It is a real mixture of fiction based on fact, with some characters being given their factual names and all of the characters written about made believable and interesting, whether they are fact or fiction. The author has written in such a way that anyone reading this book will share in the tensions and excitement felt by everyone involved in the wonderful discoveries made at Sutton Hoo in 1939. He also brings home to the reader a sense of the meticulous care and patience needed by any archaeologist and, in doing so, has written a very good story.

\*Sutton Hoo is the site of the grave of an Anglo-Saxon king in Suffolk. Discovered in 1939, it is one of the largest and best-preserved archaeological finds of the Saxon period in Europe.

#### **Nature Notes**

Well, what a difference a day makes. On Easter Sunday I was enjoying the sunshine while watching a pair of marsh harriers sky dancing on the banks of the Chet towards Hardley Cross. Adding to my enjoyment a solitary sand martin flew past. The next day, I watched a mixed flock of fieldfare, redwings and starlings at Seething through falling snow. Well, I suppose it was a Bank Holiday!

By the 5<sup>th</sup> March I became aware that the I was seeing the splashes of white blossom in hedgerows, signifying the blackthorn was in flower. At ground level, yellow coltsfoot, lesser celandine and primroses were announcing the arrival of Spring.

There were murmurations of starlings both at Langley Dyke and Hardley Staithe; only small flocks of around 50 birds but equally impressive as they flew as one. I was fortunate many years ago to watch a flock of over a million birds down on the Somerset Levels and that was absolutely awesome!

It wasn't until the 22<sup>nd</sup> March that I saw my second butterfly, a peacock, but since then I have regularly seen brimstone, comma, peacock and small tortoiseshell on sunny days along with a variety of bees and other insects. Also, I heard my first chiff chaff and saw my first one three days later.

I finally caught up with seeing a pair of grey partridges on 23<sup>rd</sup> March. Having scoured fields since the beginning of the year, a pair of them landed in front of the car in Seething. I was able to stop safely and watch them for a while. Four days before that, I was fortunate to come across a little owl near Hardley Hall. I had parked by a large oak tree and was aware of a bird flying over my head and disappearing into another oak tree. It took some time to locate it but it offered good views of the little owl once I had.

During the last week of March, I saw a common shrew run across a track. I have rarely even seen shrews except finding dead ones. Just before I started gathering my thoughts to write, a blackcap, another summer visitor, was visible from our kitchen window. I normally hear them first and have to wait until they start singing from a prominent perch.

At the end of last year, I put up two new nest boxes. All this year blue tits have been investigating both boxes which has been fascinating to watch. They will go in then leave and fly to a different perch and repeat the sequence many times. It's almost as if they are measuring the distance from the nest boxes to all of their perches. Hopefully, we will have a couple of pairs breeding, I will keep you updated. By the time you read this we will be into May, and most of the Summer migrants will have arrived, with birds like Swifts arriving during the first week of May. As we hopefully head for warmer weather and the freedom to explore, further afield, do enjoy what you see, hear and smell.

#### **Gardening Notes**

#### From the Allotment

You should now be planting out your onions and shallots. The easiest and most reliable way is to grow them from 'sets', which are small young bulbs. Feed with concentrated seaweed extract, homemade comfrey feed or wood ash once they get going. They also need lots of water to get to a good size. Loddon Garden and DIY sell onion and shallot sets loose, which is less wasteful than the tiny bags garden centres mostly sell them in. There is less choice bulk buying this way, but I have found them to be reliable varieties.

Comfrey is simple to grow and spreads rapidly. The leaves can be cut at least twice a year and added straight to the soil or to compost or made into a liquid feed. The flowers are also great for pollinators. It is rich in potash, phosphorus, and calcium: ideal for boosting vegetables, flowers and tubers. Nettle feed is better for green leaf crops or giving things a boost e.g. after frost damage, as it is rich in nitrogen, mineral salts and iron.

At its simplest you can stuff the comfrey or nettles in a bucket and fill it with rainwater. After two weeks it will be ready to use and smell a lot. For this reason, some people either buy a specialist container (I have one from Hozelock) or use a small barrel with a tap. The feed is always used diluted and can be either sprayed onto crops or applied around the plant roots with a watering can.

#### From the Garden

May is a busy time in the garden, lets hope the weather has warmed up as I write this, I have been sheltering from either hail, snow or strong winds or all three! Hopefully the sun will come out long enough to persuade the seeds to germinate.

As the danger of frosts pass, plant out summer bedding plants, dahlias and cannas. Provide support for tall plants such as delphiniums, lupins and hollyhocks before they get too tall. Plant sweet peas and tie in as they grow; if you pinch out the tips the plants will bush out and give you more blooms. Lift and divide large clumps of spring bulbs and divide primroses, remembering to give all spring bulbs a liquid feed to build up the bulbs for next year's flowers. Seeds that can be sown this month for flowering next year are foxgloves, dianthus and wallflowers. Chrysanthemums can be planted out now and at the Norfolk chrysanthemum show a couple of years ago I came across fantasy varieties; these look very different from the standard chrysanthemum you see in flower bouquets at the supermarket, they are late flowering and I am

tempted by a variety called Fleur de lis (purple) and Lava (orange). They can be grown outside in the summer before being moved into a cold greenhouse for flowering. I will let you know how I get on.

#### LODDON WAR MEMORIAL—100 YEARS

May 2021 marks the centenary of the building, unveiling and dedication of Loddon War Memorial. The focus of Loddon Royal British Legion's annual November remembrance, the war memorial is actually owned, maintained and protected by Loddon Parish Council under the War Memorials (Local Authorities Powers) Act of 1923 and it has, within the last few years, installed steps in front of it to give better access to those paying their respects.

Following the horrors of World War One (the war to end all wars), a committee was set up, under the chairmanship of Mr Edward Cadge, to raise funds to enable the building of a memorial to honour those men of Loddon and surrounding villages who had died because of the war. Using the money raised, the committee employed G. Maile and Son, of Euston Road in London, to build and erect a memorial on consecrated ground, part of Holy Trinity churchyard. Old photographs show that when it was built in 1921, the memorial was behind iron railings, some of which have since been removed. The memorial itself cost £201.10s.4d (about £11,000.00 in today's money), but preparing the ground and digging out a foundation took the cost to nearer £250.0s.0d.

The war memorial is about twelve feet high (approx 3.6 metres) and is made of rough Cornish granite. The names of the twenty-eight fallen of World War One are recorded on its lower half in inlaid imperishable lead lettering. The symbolic design at the top of the memorial incorporates a celtic cross, denoting the eternal (or eternity), and a downfacing crusader's sword, unsheathed, denoting sacrifice and peace—the whole design assuming that World War One would, indeed, be an unrepeatable conflict.

After World War Two, space had to be found to accommodate sixteen extra names. This left little option but to install a plaque, fixed to the memorial, to add the extra names of the fifteen men and one woman (Corporal Muriel Stubbs ATS, who had died in 1945 in Egypt, where she was buried). If you wish to learn more about those named on the war memorial, you can find their potted histories in a folder kindly compiled by the Revd Ros Hoffmann and held in the porch of Holy Trinity church.

To mark and commemorate this first landmark centenary, there will be a socially distanced outdoor public short service of re-dedication at 4:00pm on Sunday 23<sup>rd</sup> May on Church Plain conducted by the Revd David Owen. Loddon Parish Council cordially invite any who would wish to join them there.
